How I began to look at human rights in a new way...

When people think about human rights, a picture of large groups of Indigenous Australian or protesting women may come up in their mind. However, issues related to human rights can occur a lot at places like schools as well.

There is a boy in the school I go to. To put it nicely, he is not very popular among other students. In fact, almost every member in the school disliked him. The thing that everyone dislikes about him is his personality- the way he throws annoying remarks and complaining words all the time. I had always thought that it was all right to treat him that way. "He deserves it," that was what I had always told myself when I saw him getting bullied or yelled at. That was until one day when my view towards this whole incident completely turned around...

I remember talking to a friend of mine, who is in his class. Slowly, she told me an event that took place in her class on that particular day.
